This course considers issues of our diversity as humans broadly defined to include race, ethnicity, culture, religion, nationality, religion, sexuality, gender expression, immigration, and social inequality. Through an interdisciplinary social science lens, we will examine the following fundamental questions: Who are you?" and "What/who has influenced who you are and who you wish to become? Students will explore the differences and dynamics of ethnicity, racism, multiculturalism, and transnationalism in domestic and international contexts.

Format – The course format will include weekly in-person lectures. The lecture will include small group discussions, in-class exercises, case studies, and examples.

### Course Goals and Learning Outcomes


Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate verbal and written awareness of basic theoretical approaches to immigration, multiculturalism, identity, culture, race/ethnicity, and diversity.
- Examine diversity issues, including social inequality, race, ethnicity, immigration, religion, gender, and sexuality and relate them to real-world examples.
- Critically analyze the concept of inequality for under-represented communities such as Indigenous people, racialized communities, immigrants, women, LGBTQ2+, and other marginalized groups and make connections with systemic discrimination experienced by those groups in society.
- Engage in respectful dialogue with others while honouring diversified views and opinions.
- Recognize that prior experience and cultural contexts shape an individual's viewpoint.
